



# Learning Recovery & Extended Learning Plan

District Name:	Indian Creek Local School District
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On February 9, 2021, Governor DeWine asked schools and districts to work with their communities and educational stakeholders to help students continue to advance academically and to make up for any learning that may have been lost or delayed due to the coronavirus pandemic and related disruptions.

**“This once-in-a-lifetime pandemic has impacted all of us, so it should be no surprise that it has impacted our children. But we should not panic, nor should we be surprised by the results of assessments,” said Governor DeWine. “Instead, we should do what Ohioans have always done when facing a challenge – stay calm, roll up our sleeves, and work to solve the problem.”**

Governor DeWine has requested that schools and districts design plans that address learning recovery and extended learning opportunities to meet the needs of students that could include, but are not limited to, extending the current school year, beginning the new year early, extending the school day or instituting summer programs, tutoring, remote options, and other remedial or supplemental activities.

Plans should address, but are not limited to, the following key components:

- **Impacted Students:** How will schools and districts identify which students have been most impacted by the pandemic in terms of their learning progress (with a focus on the most vulnerable student populations)?
- **Needs Assessment:** How will schools and districts identify the needs of those students?
- **Resources and Budget:** What resources are available to address those needs? Generally, what is the budget for the plan?
- **Approaches:** What approaches can best be deployed to address those needs? (This may include approaches such as ending the school year later than scheduled, beginning the new year early, extending the school day, summer programs, tutoring, and remote options.)
- **Partnerships:** Which local and regional partners (such as Educational Service Centers, Information Technology Centers, libraries, museums, after-school programs, or civic organizations) can schools and districts engage in supporting student needs?
- **Alignment:** How can this plan reinforce and align to other district or school plans? This may include but is not limited to Student Wellness and Success Fund plans, remote learning plans, improvement plans, CCIP-related plans, graduation plans.

Each district or school should consider its unique needs and issues and prepare its plan in a way that responds appropriately and leverages the assets of its unique partners including their Educational Service Center and other regional and community-based partners. Each district or school should consider a wide range of representation and voices from district and community stakeholders in planning for learning recovery and extended learning opportunities.

The governor asked schools and districts to provide their plans to the public and General Assembly no later than April 1.

# Learning Recovery & Extended Learning Plan

## Identifying Academic Needs

**Impacted Students:**

*How will schools/districts identify which students have been most impacted by the pandemic in terms of their learning progress (with a focus on the most vulnerable student populations including but not limited to disengaged students)?*

Indian Creek School Schools continues to use data-driven decision-making to identify academic needs for all students in the 2020-2021 SY and in future school years. Each building principal and guidance team will collaborate with teachers to target students in need of credit recovery (6-12) and/or those students experiencing learning gaps and in need of tutoring and extended learning (K-5) especially in the area of English Language Arts and Math.

Data points may include:

- OST exams (3-8), • EOC - End of course exams (9-12), • Third grade reading guarantee • Core course grades
- DIBELS – Reading Fluency (K-3) and Screening (K-1, 2- 5, 6-8); fluency measures used to regularly monitor early literacy and reading skills. • F/SA – Formative (Common) /Summative Assessments
- Student Projects and Performances, •Formal and Informal Observations, •Oral Communication/Open Questioning, •Running Records, •Map Skills, •Checklists, •Discussions, •Exit Tickets, •Feedback, • Rubrics, •Self and Peer Assessment, •Ungraded Classwork, •Quizzes•Paper and-Pencil Tests
- School leadership teams and teacher teams identify schoolwide trends to inform learning opportunities provided and also learning gaps. Grade-level or content based teacher teams identify strengths/gaps and make changes to instruction/intervention, as needed.
- The purpose of classroom assessments is to provide real-time data to engage students in the learning process, to evaluate student learning in both summative (grading) and formative (ongoing feedback) assessment activities, and to plan targeted, meaningful future instruction.



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## Approaches to Address Academic Gap Filling

### Approaches & Removing/Overcoming Barriers

The Indian Creek School District will use multiple opportunities to extend learning. The district uses embedded daily activities in the schedule at the secondary level (Flex Period) for academic review and wellness updates. The district also uses the MTSS (multi-tiered systems of support) for all students, PBIS, the CARE Team that works with wrap-around agencies and school district staff to monitor and target students and families in need of academic and wellness support.

In the Summer of 2021, The Indian Creek School District will offer a K-12, voluntary academic program this June and July for any student in the district. Governor Mike DeWine issued a directive to all Ohio public school districts in February, 2021 “to work with their communities to help students advance and make-up for any learning that may have been lost or delayed because of the pandemic over the past year.” Attendance is not mandatory, however perfect attendance incentives will be offered. Obviously, any student attempting to achieve credit recovery cannot miss class.

Because Indian Creek has some students experiencing learning gaps, the district will offer conventional, in-person classes, as well as the more typical “credit recovery” program that has been established in Indian Creek High School using the remote learning method. The district will offer 54 total hours of instruction spread over an 8 week period.

Instruction for grades PK - 8 will be held at Indian Creek Middle School while instruction for grades 9-12 will be held at the high school. Indian Creek teachers will be teaching these courses.

Busing will be provided and participating students will receive breakfast and lunch.

Principals and guidance counselors will be targeting students at-risk in not being promoted to their next grade level for the 2021-2022 school year. Open registration is also encouraged. Core courses will be offered with emphasis in Math, Literacy, Science, and Social Studies. A course schedule will be released later this spring.



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## Approaches to Identify and Address Social & Emotional Needs

Similar to the approaches to identify and address academic needs, Indian Creek Schools will use traditional data targets such as nine-week grades, attendance, behavior, and the MTSS (multi-tiered support services) as important data-driven indicators for student growth and identifying gaps for SEL for ALL In-Person and Remote Learners. The key partnerships for referrals and progress monitoring are team-based through staff, teachers, intervention specialists, special services, guidance counselors, principals, PBIS, CARE Team, Community Mental Health, SRO's, parents, and family services. The district will employ SEL supports in a variety of teaching and learning techniques.

Indian Creek Schools has worked to improve students' overall well-being by making solid connections among family, school, and community. Hear from our team members about how this works with our school-based mental health providers, school administration, teachers, and family support specialists. We will share our best strategies for connecting students and their families to local resources.



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## PROFESSIONAL LEARNING NEEDS

*What Professional Learning activities will be needed/offered to your district's teachers and partners to support learning recovery?*

Indian Creek School Schools will continue to embed Professional Development throughout the school year. In the 2021-2022 SY calendar, the district has scheduled six and a half teacher/staff In-Service days allowing for over 40 hours of support time for staff on in-depth student data analysis, safety, MTSS, professional development for select licensure areas, district and Ohio Department of Education initiatives, as well as federal and state laws.

The district will continue to partner with the Jefferson County Educational Service Center and other local, regional, and state agencies/partners on the most relevant teaching, coaching and learning philosophies and sciences in education today. The district will work to understand and meet the needs of the whole child during this pandemic and beyond.
